During the last several months, we have been working hard on the following issues:

March 18th, we met with Commissioner Uribe to discuss crime, drugs, prostitution, panhandlers, ATV offroad motorcycles and beautification within the Pine Castle Safe Communities area. Commissioner Uribe

is on board in trying to bring Pine Castle back to its former glory. I think over the next couple of years we will see some improvements towards that end.

Also in March, we met with the Pine Castle Historical Society to discuss the renovations of the Crawford house and other historical sites within Pine Castle.

April 11th, we attended the community meeting put on by Commissioner Uribe and Sheriff John Mina. We had a fairly good crowd, and all were vocal over the issues facing our





community. Big topics were the boat speeders on the lakes and the ATV's and offroad motorcycles. We have followed up with the Sheriff's Office and they have beefed up patrols within our area to put a stop to this behavior. You should be seeing more deputies in both marked and unmarked cars within the Skylake area to deal with this issue.

Fertilize Responsibly

Protect Our Springs, Lakes, and Rivers

Fertilizer Facts

Many fertilizers contain nitrogen and phosphorus, also known as *nutrients*. Pollution from nutrients harms our natural waterbodies – springs, lakes and rivers – by causing algae blooms and poor water quality. How does nutrient pollution get there? When yards are over-fertilized, the excess nitrogen and phosphorus flow with rainwater into the same stormwater system designed to keep your property and roads from flooding during heavy rain. By doing something as simple as choosing fertilizer carefully and applying it properly, together we can make a big impact on the health of our natural water bodies.

Orange County Fertilizer Ordinance

Summer Restrictions

Only trained residents and commercia applicators may apply fertilizer during the rainy season June 1 - September 30. To take the online training class, visit www.ocfl.net/FertilizeResponsibly.

Use Nitrogen Carefully

Nitrogen containing fertilizers must contain at least 50% slow release nitrogen until a 65% slow-release formula becomes available (expected by July 2020). Using slow release ensures plants are delivered a steady tream of nitrogen that they can uptake over time. No nore than one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 sq ft can be applied per application.



Keep Fertilizers Out of Storm Drains

Sweep up fertilizer that falls on driveways, streets and sidewalks. Hosing off pavements is bad because it washes pollutants into storm drains.

More is Not Better

Apply fertilizer according to the bag's label for your grass to grow best. Dense roots and healthy shoots are the result of just the right amount of fertilizer. A healthy lawn is able to filter impurities from runoff better, keeping surface water clean.
